

The 12 Steps Revisited/Step 7

"SOMETIMES the mere reading of Step Seven gives me a deeply excited, tingling feeling. I think of those moments--and who in AA who has been around for a time has not known them, or something like them?--when I felt I was actually in touch with the Higher Power as I understood Him. I think of the even more vivid experiences of some of my AA colleagues. And I experience a thrill, as new and fresh each time it comes as it was the first time I felt it, that the very source of the universe can be directly approached--not just by saints, geniuses and biblical characters, but by miserable self-defeating drunks and ex-drunks, capable at any moment of reverting, like myself.

At other times I read the same Step and think, "ask Him? Who's Him? God? Who's He?" The possibility of being in communication with the Creator seems as remote as Mount Kilimanjaro; a Creator's very existence seems doubtful.

Later I learned, through reading, that these contradictory feelings are almost universal. Veteran writers on the spiritual life--and I accept the Big Book's statement that the AA program is "the maintenance and growth of a spiritual experience"--even have a name for this state of doubt: "the dark night of the soul."

This discovery helped me to answer questions I had asked as a newcomer and have heard many times since: "How do you take the Steps--all at once or now and then? In order or skipping around? And when?" The question answered itself. I couldn't wholeheartedly ask anything of a Power I was not in touch with and wasn't sure existed. I had to take Step Seven when the feeling was on me that the Power was near and in touch and available and listening. Then, and then only, could I ask what I had to ask in Step Seven and really, deeply mean it.

I have formulated some notions about things that keep these times from coming more frequently. The times God seems improbable, I have noticed, usually coincide with the times I am most involved in everyday commerce and controversy. In grandfather's day a lot of people used to say "I'll meet you at one o'clock, God willing." Now people meet at appointed times "if traffic permits," and there's a difference. We are affected by this difference. The unspoken assumption of everyday life is that there is no God who matters. Through habit we come to accept this assumption. It feels so right, when you're swinging along with the regiment, to be in step. It's hard, even dangerous, to contend that everybody is out of step but Johnny, even though it may be true. We in AA have rediscovered that there is a Higher Power who cares about each one of us, regardless of what the regiment may think. We have found it to our advantage, insofar as sustained sobriety is our goal, to ask Him to remove our shortcomings. We do this when and as we can, and this is our Step Seven.

Besides "Him" and "asked" and "remove" there are two other words I have found important in Number Seven--"humbly" and "shortcomings." I've learned something about shortcomings during the past few years I hadn't known before. It's how they differ from other things called "limitations." There are certain human limitations God is unlikely

to remove in this stage of existence, no matter how much we implore Him. Now I see I was asking something God had never granted. We all have limitations. I cannot walk unequipped on still air, nor can anyone else. Even the great and versatile Leonardo conceded that Michelangelo was a better sculptor than he was, and Raphael a better painter. To excel in any field calls for lifelong singleness of purpose, particularly in our age of specialization. There are fixed limitations of our earthly condition and it is out of bounds to ask that they be removed.

"Shortcomings" is another matter altogether. A shortcoming, as I understand it, is failing to measure up to a reasonable--not an unreasonable--expectation. It is reasonable to try to render the help that is within our power when it is asked; to reduce the voltage of fear, anger, pride, envy, impatience, intolerance and malice that flickers through our lives; to try to get rid of the resentments that could destroy our sobriety. To slight any one of these efforts is, as I have come to see it, an AA shortcoming. I believe God will work with us toward removing them if we ask Him to, humbly.

Humbly? The classic explanation of humility, Bible readers will recall, is in the story wherein the solidly-on-the-program Job, vexed at his run of bad luck, challenges God: "Show me my fault!" God does not argue, but asks Job, "Can you cause the sun to come up or the moon to rise?" On this word "humbly," I'm quoting from something I wrote on Step Seven in "Twelve Steps and the Older Member," as it appeared in the Grapevine seven years ago:

"What is humility? It became one of the really vital words in my new AA vocabulary, but just exactly what did it mean?"

"During the first year or so, humility to me meant an absence of pride. 'You've got to be cut down to size,' an old-timer remarked, and I flared in resentment. Even while protesting, though, I had a hunch he was right, and it soon grew into a conviction. Getting humility was going to be a grim, bumpy business of getting rid of pride." J. E., Guilford, CT

It Happened In JULY

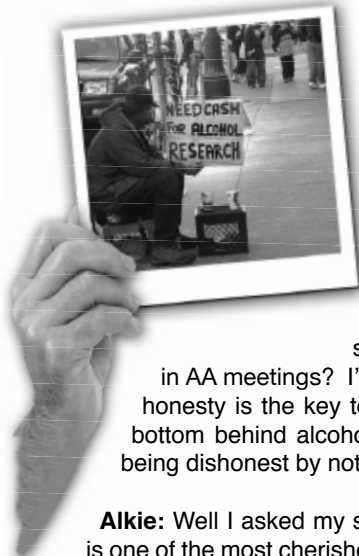
July 1934 - Bill W's second admission to Towns Hospital (again paid by Dr Leonard V Strong). Bill met Dr Silkworth for the first time. Silkworth explained the obsession and allergy of alcoholism but Bill started drinking again almost immediately upon discharge. Bill was unemployable, \$50,000 in debt (\$675,000 today) suicidal and drinking around the clock (Source: AA Timeline, www.silkworth.net)

July, 1938 - Dr William Duncan Silkworth wrote a letter of support for AA for use in fundraising for the book. The letter was incorporated into the chapter "The Doctor's Opinion" in the yet-to-be-published Big Book. Dr Esther L. R. of Baltimore was the AA member who suggested to Bill W to get a "Number one physician" in the alcoholism field to write an introduction.

Are we supporting our support system?

Group contributions to Intergroup through the five months ending May 2009 are down 15%, or \$4,167. And as we know, group contributions for all of last year (2008) were down 15% or \$8,703. Certainly part of this is economy driven, and part of this may be changes in group conscious or new treasurers with lack of direction from their group. We are truly grateful for the contributions made by groups, and recognize that the first priority is the preservation of the group. The purpose of this article is simply to inform the groups in South Palm Beach County of our situation.

Recognizing this as an issue, the Steering Committee put on the 25th Anniversary Picnic and a raffle, and fortunately it was a well supported success. This has allowed us to rebuild our prudent reserve to some degree. We also have two fund raisers planned for the last three months of the year – The 6th Annual Serenity Scramble in October, and the 21st Annual Gratitude Dinner in November. But it is the consistent contributions of individual groups that allow intergroup to serve.

Detailed below is an article that appeared in the April 1995 Grapevine titled “Are We Supporting Our Support System?” It might be something you want to review with your Home Group, particularly if your Group has not been supporting intergroup or other AA service entities.

“When was the last time your group made a contribution to your local Intergroup? Has it been a month, two months, or six months? Or is your group one of those that has never made a contribution? Is this apathy or just a lack of knowledge?”

“I serve on the advisory board for our intergroup office and it seems no one is willing to make contributions any more. It’s becoming harder and harder to support our intergroup office and provide the services necessary for our AA community.

“As a member of the advisory board I knew it was part of my job to help find some answers to this problem. I started questioning the meeting I regularly attended, asking them point blank why they hadn’t made a contribution. The answers received astonished me. One group told me that the secretary decided they wouldn’t make a contribution because they needed the money for the group’s social activities. Another secretary told a group member that he’d do what he damn well wanted with the money.

“Then there were groups who said there just wasn’t enough money left over to make contributions. Some secretaries admitted they had to kick in their own money to keep the group going.

“The hardest and saddest stories I heard were from groups that simply didn’t know how and where to make a contribution.

“The basics of intergroup information are published regularly in our local service newsletter. In addition, a pamphlet from GSO on the question of self-support is sent regularly in the secretary’s packet. Either groups don’t read the secretary packet or they’ve never paid any attention to the information under the heading “Contributions.” Unfortunately, we have many secretaries out there who are new in sobriety. They’re not even out of the fog before someone pushes the job of secretary on them.

“New in sobriety, I received really clear-cut directions from my sponsor about how much time in sobriety was recommended before I made a commitment to certain service positions. When my time did arrive to serve, I was informed what I needed to do. I was told the coffee was

to be made an hour before the meeting time so there would be time for fellowship. All of the literature was to be displayed on the table, especially the Big Book. Most importantly, I was told that regular contributions to support our intergroup office must be made.

“I realize that all newcomers have sponsors. But the group has a responsibility to inform those secretaries who are newcomers.

“So how do we get the word passed around? Maybe those who care about intergroup should start questioning the groups they attend about contributions. What’s wrong with asking group if they understand they should make contributions on a regular basis, explaining what they need to do?”

“I can hear the responses already: It’s not my job. Let someone else do it. I didn’t get sober to spend my time running after a bunch of drunks and keeping them straight.

“The fact is, there are only so many of us in service. We need help, so we turn to other members. They need to remember that AA stands for unity, recovery, and service.

“Bill W. said if AA was to be destroyed, it would be from within. It would be sad if it was due to apathy.”
